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Overview of Adipex (Phentermine)

Adipex-P is the brand name for **phentermine hydrochloride**, a prescription medication used as a **short-term aid in weight loss**. It's part of a complete program that includes calorie reduction, exercise, and behavior change. Adipex, also known as Phentermine, is a prescription medication that is used to help with weight loss. It works by suppressing your appetite and increasing your energy levels, helping you to lose weight more effectively. Adipex is typically prescribed for individuals who are obese or who have weight-related medical problems.

Phentermine is a **sympathomimetic amine**—chemically similar to an amphetamine—that suppresses appetite by increasing certain neurotransmitters (norepinephrine and dopamine) in the brain.

Because it can raise heart rate and blood pressure and has some potential for dependence, Adipex is classified as a **Schedule IV controlled substance** in the United States.

How Adipex Works

- **Appetite suppression:** By stimulating the hypothalamus, Adipex decreases hunger signals.
- **Energy boost:** It slightly increases metabolism and alertness, helping users feel more energetic while reducing calorie intake.
- **Short-term use:** The effect is strongest during the first several weeks, and the drug is typically prescribed for **up to 12 weeks**.

Typical Dosages

Formulation	Common Strength	Usual Schedule
Adipex-P tablets	37.5 mg	Once daily before breakfast or 1–2 hours afterward
Capsules	15 mg or 30 mg	Once daily in the morning

Important tips

- Take it early in the day to avoid insomnia.
- Do not double doses if one is missed.
- Always follow the dosage your healthcare provider prescribes; taking more does *not* improve weight loss and can raise cardiovascular risks.

Approved Uses

- **Short-term management of obesity** (BMI ≥ 30 kg/m², or ≥ 27 kg/m² with risk factors such as diabetes, hypertension, or high cholesterol).
- **Adjunct to diet and exercise**, never a stand-alone solution.

Doctors may occasionally switch patients to combination medications such as **phentermine/topiramate (Qsymia)** for longer-term therapy if appropriate.

Possible Side Effects

Common (often lessen with continued use)

- Dry mouth
- Insomnia

- Increased heart rate
- Restlessness or nervousness
- Constipation

Serious (contact your doctor immediately)

- Chest pain, palpitations, or shortness of breath
- Severe headache or vision changes
- Mood changes, anxiety, or agitation
- Swelling in feet or legs

Long-term concerns

Using Adipex beyond the prescribed period can lead to tolerance (reduced effect) or dependence. Stopping abruptly after long use may cause fatigue and depression.

Precautions and Interactions

Do **not** use Adipex if you:

- Have heart disease, arrhythmia, or uncontrolled hypertension
- Have hyperthyroidism or glaucoma
- Are pregnant or breastfeeding
- Used MAOI antidepressants within the past 14 days

Tell your doctor about:

- Any stimulant medications or decongestants you use
- Diabetes medicines (dose adjustments may be needed)
- Alcohol or caffeine intake, which can worsen side effects

Safe and Legal Access

To obtain Adipex safely:

1. **Consult a healthcare provider.** A doctor must confirm that phentermine is appropriate for you and check your blood pressure, weight, and health history.
2. **Use a licensed pharmacy.** You can fill the prescription in person or through a legitimate online pharmacy that *requires* a prescription from your doctor.
3. **Avoid “no-prescription” websites.** They are illegal in most countries and may sell counterfeit or contaminated products.
4. **Monitor progress.** Regular follow-ups allow your provider to track side effects and decide when to stop or adjust therapy.
